# This must see exhibit explores the history and politics of women's bicycling

In 1895, American activist Elizabeth Cady Stanton famously declared that "many a woman is riding to suffrage on a bicycle." From the fashionable lady cyclists of the Victorian era to the politically motivated suffragette scouts of the Edwardian age, the bicycle has long been associated with liberated women.

This free foyer exhibit curated by Vera Douie Fellow Dr Sheila Hanlon uses rare and seldom seen artefacts from The Women's Library to explore the politics of women's cycling in late nineteenth and early twentieth century Britain, with a focus on the suffrage campaign and some surprises along the way.


